2.1.2 Academic Flexibility	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Various major with minor subject combinations in Arts, Science and Commerce streams • Three self-financing degree courses. • Choice based credit system in place.
2.1.3 Curriculum Enrichment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Workshops, Seminars and expert lectures are organized. • New programmes/courses for value-added courses to be introduced.
2.1.4 Feedback System	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Feedback collected from students in a formal process. • Feedback is analysed and necessary actions taken. • Feedback need to be taken from other stakeholders.

2.2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Admission process through advertisement and merit is transparent. • Government reservation policy followed for admission. • Most preferred college in the region.
2.2.2 Catering to Student Diversity	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Required facilities for differently abled students not available. • Slow and advanced learners are identified and given guidance through tutorials. • Girl students are exempted from paying tuition fees as per State Govt. rules.
2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • IQAC receives feedback of students, monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching. • Academic schedule is meticulously planned and implemented. • Teacher student ratio needs to be improved.

2.2.4 Teacher Quality	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 22 teachers are Ph.D. qualified, 26 have M.Phil. • Many teachers attend Faculty Development Programmes. • No formal evaluation of teachers by students except in BCA.
2.2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Evaluation process is formulated by the University and implemented by the college. • As a reform of the evaluation process, internal assessment is executed. • Grievance redressal cell should be more active.
2.2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Success rate of students is high in BSc, but poor in Arts and Commerce. • One rank holder in University exam. • Formal mechanism for incremental academic growth yet to be devised.
2.3 Research, Consultancy & Extension	
2.3.1 Promotion of Research	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No Research committee or Research centre, research at individual level only. • Several workshops and symposia are organized.
2.3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No budget allocated for research and no seed money. • No minor or major projects for research.
2.3.3 Research Facilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Books, journals and internet and INFLIBNET facility available. • Research Laboratory equipments need to be procured.
2.3.4 Research Publications and Awards	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Faculty published 58 papers and 36 books. • Some faculty members presented papers in seminars/conferences. • Very few award received by the faculty.
2.3.5 Consultancy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No consultancy work.
2.3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NSS, NCC and Rovers and Rangers programmes are active. • Tree plantation, polio campaign, blood donation and Village development programmes are executed. • Students participating in extension activities are given incentives.

2.4 Infrastructure and Learning Resources

2.4.1 Physical Facilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The college has a built-up area of 4000 sq m. on 5 acre of land with 33 class rooms, 13 laboratories, 3 computer rooms, Conference Hall. • Gymnasium and sports facilities available. • The college built a new Girls Hostel in addition to existing one Boys Hostel.
2.4.2 Library as a Learning Resource	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 250 sq m library space with 100 seating capacity is open on working days in the week during the day. • Library added books and journals regularly over last five years. • INFLIBNET and 10 Mbps broadband facility, but no OPAC.
2.4.3 IT Infrastructure	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Computer-student ratio 1:51 with 87 computers. • Internet facility available in select places. • Windows XP and LINUX facility used.
2.4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Funds allocated for maintenance of Building, Furniture, computer and other equipment. • Old buildings need to be renovated.

- Faculty should apply for Minor and Major Research Funds from external sources.
- Old buildings need immediate renovation.
- Accommodation for girls in hostels to be enhanced.
- Build energy efficient campus with waste management system .
- English and commerce labs be established.
- Yoga Centre and Health Centre be created.
