Concept of Gender and human development. Gender disaggregated data/gender statistics. From Women in Development to Gender and Development. Gender Inequality. Capability approaches. Perspectives on men and masculinities ineconomic development. Relationship between economic growth and gender equality, empowerment (emphasis on economic empowerment). Indicators of economic inequalities. Third gender and development: substance and indicators. Demographic changes and gender status. Gender interpretation of causes ofdemographic shift in birth rates. Child sex preferences and secondary sex ratio. Gender differences in mortality: concept and factors - biological, environment, discrimination and behavioural (lifestyle) factors. Subject and methods of gender economics. Feminist economic critique of mainstream economics and alternatives. Feminist perspectives on economic methods and arguments. Gender inequality in the labour market: entry into and exit from the labour market, careers, wages, skills training. Inequality and discrimination. Factors in wage disparities. Gender dimension of employment of youth and older persons.




















GENDER EQUITY STRENGTH CHART OF

LAST FIVE YEARS







College enrollment data session 2018-19




College enrollment data session 2018-19 (Boys&Girls)














College enrollment data session 2019-20








College enrollment data session 2020-21









